Resource partner profile: Republic of Korea

The Republic of Korea provides both core and earmarked funding to GGGI. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs provides annual core funding to retain its status as a contributing member, as defined by the Agreement on the Establishment of GGGI. The Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) provides earmarked funding it supports of GGGI's Country Planning Frameworks, such as in the Philippines to mainstream climate resilience and inclusive green growth in the agricultural sector of Oriental Mindoro, and in the Pacific to increase access to energy through renewable technologies in rural areas in Fiji, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, and Vanuatu. GGGI also partners with the Korea Forest Service on sustainable forest and landscape management, and the Korea Rural Economic Institute on climate smart agriculture.

Through the partnership, GGGI will help Pacific countries to develop climate change policies, plans and investment road maps across a wide range of sectors – such as electricity, transport, agriculture, tourism, and urban planning. As countries set out their economic recovery strategies from the COVID-19 pandemic, there are opportunities to accelerate climate action and this partnership will utilize this crucial time to make change. Earmarked resource partner profile: Green Climate Fund

The Green Climate Fund (GCF) and GGGI have formed a strategic partnership to bolster developing country capacities to deal with the unprecedented challenge of climate change. To ensure that GGGI remains a neutral adviser to governments, it carries out this work as a Readiness Delivery Partner; GGGI is not a GCF Accredited Entity that proposes and carries out climate finance projects that are approved by the GCF Board. Over 20 countries have requested GGGI to act as a Readiness Delivery Partner. GGGI's in-country teams have supported 21 GGGI's government partners access over USD 19 million in GCF-approved Readiness funding and submitted over USD 12 million of Readiness proposals. Read more.
